

About us

DemocracyNext is an international research and action institute dedicated to *scaling bigh quality, empowered, and permanent citizens'* assemblies. Our programmes aim to achieve this through building or creating new *infrastructure, institutions, innovation, impactful storytelling, and systemic change.*

Our small but mighty organisation's values are:


- → **Rigour**: We approach our work with intellectual rigour, ensuring that our methods and recommendations are grounded in evidence and best practices.
- → **Curiosity**: We constantly explore new frontiers in deliberative democracy, seeking to catalyse technological innovation and refine approaches to citizens' assemblies.
- → **Collaboration**: We work with a wide range of partners around the world and across sectors to achieve our shared goals, recognising that collective action is crucial for systemic change.
- → Vision: We aspire to transform democratic practices fundamentally, envisioning a world where citizens' assemblies are integral to decision-making processes.

About citizens' assemblies

Citizens' assemblies are brave spaces for creative problem solving – for public policies, legislation, or tough organisational decisions. They are designed for exercising our collective intelligence, engaging with complexity, and finding common ground.

Also known as civic assemblies, deliberative minipublics, or citizens' juries, at the heart, all embody three principles: **sortition** (selecting decision makers by lottery, or random selection), **deliberation** (collectively weighing evidence for shared decisions), and **rotation** (taking turns representing, and being represented by others).

A citizens' assembly can range in size from roughly 20-200 people. Selected at random from a community or nation, they ideally have a mandate from a public authority, which can be a government entity or the leaders of a museum, school, university, or other institution. Assemblies typically meet for at least 5-6 days over a significant period of time (usually 3-6 months). Assembly members are compensated for their time, and are supported by a team of specialist facilitators who are brought in to lead the process, and ensure the citizens are well supported. They hear from a breadth and diversity of experts on the topic, including those with personal experience; they deliberate on possible policy fixes in small, usually facilitated groups; and they vote to see which ideas win supermajority approval, then propose these ideas as a package to the mandating authority.

Since the first modern citizens' assembly was held in British Columbia, Canada in 2004, **more than 700 citizens' assemblies** have been held worldwide. Some achieve notable success, like breakthroughs on <u>abortion and same-sex marriage in Ireland</u>. Their numbers have been <u>snowballing</u> since the late 2010s.

Our projects | Cities Programme

In 2024, DemocracyNext began work with the cities of **Esch-sur-Alzette**, **Luxembourg**; **Kerewan**, **The Gambia**; **and Vilnius**, **Lithuania** to implement citizens' assemblies across multiple municipal institutions.

Our programme aims to:

- → Support cities in their efforts to become centres of democratic innovation, using citizens' assemblies to address complex urban challenges and promote civic engagement.
- → Train and mentor city officials and local practitioners on the design and implementation of citizens' assemblies, fostering the long-term sustainability of these initiatives.
- → Research and evaluate the impact of citizens' assemblies in city settings, providing insights into best practices and informing future programme development.

Our projects | Deschutes Civic Assembly on Youth Homelessness

In 2024, DemocracyNext collaborated with a range of partners in the US county of Deschutes, Oregon, to convene a <u>citizens' assembly</u> focused on addressing youth homelessness.

Together, we laid the foundation for the first permanent citizens' assembly in the US, and it was the first tech-enhanced citizens' assembly worldwide where the entirety of the deliberations were recorded. This assembly demonstrated the effectiveness of this approach in several ways:

- → **Community consensus:** 23 proposals for addressing youth homelessness received over 75% support from the assembly members.
- → Political bridge-building: The assembly brought together individuals with deeply diverse viewpoints to develop shared solutions.
- → **Policy buy-in:** The local authorities at the Central Oregon Intergovernmental Council, Deschutes County, and Bend City Council demonstrated strong commitment to the assembly process across political party lines, responding publicly and integrating the assembly's recommendations into their policy planning.
- → Technological innovation: The Deschutes assembly provided a valuable opportunity to test new technologies and AI applications that will ultimately enable outputs grounded in the voices of assembly members and open new research avenues.

Our projects | Museum assemblies

DemocracyNext has actively supported the implementation of citizens' assemblies in cultural institutions. We have:

- → Collaborated with museums in Dresden and Bonn to host groundbreaking <u>four-day assemblies</u> in 2023 and exhibitions in 2024-26, exploring the role of museums in contemporary society.
- → Advised and supported Birmingham Museums Trust as they held the <u>first citizens' jury</u> in a UK museum, acting as a critical friend and advisor throughout the process, with the story of the assembly told in a <u>short film</u>.
- → Attracted growing requests for advice and collaboration from other museums and cultural institutions as spaces for democratic deliberation, recognising their potential to engage diverse communities and foster civic dialogue.

Innovation

DemocracyNext constantly seeks to push the boundaries of deliberative democracy through experimentation and research. This includes:


- → Improving quality and legitimacy: Our <u>Assembling an Assembly Guide</u> was published in 2024 and was immediately popular, and has already been translated into Basque, Spanish, and Japanese. In 2024, the Assembly Guide had almost 8,000 views.
- → Accelerating spread: Just as we helped catalyse the technologically pioneering Deschutes Civic Assembly on Youth Homelessness, we aim to seize every opportunity to test new ways to make citizens' assemblies more accessible, less expensive, and deeply impactful.
- → **Technological innovation:** In partnership with the <u>Massachusetts Institute of</u> Technology's Center for Constructive Communication, we conducted a series of experiments in 2024 - both in the lab and during the Deschutes Assembly - exploring how artificial intelligence can enhance citizens' assembly set-ups, support deliberation, and assist in producing actionable deliverables.


Inspiring storytelling


DemocracyNext constantly seeks to push the boundaries of deliberative democracy through experimentation and research. This includes:

- → **Growing the DemNext community:** Expanding our online community - largely through our newsletter, which in 2024 expanded its reach to 11,000 subscribers on Substack and LinkedIn - to connect individuals interested in deliberative democracy, fostering dialogue, resource sharing, and collaborative action.
- → **Showcasing stories**: Using our engaged audience to give examples of citizens' assemblies and interview deliberative democracy pioneers from around the world, highlighting their impact on people and policies. This platform aims to demonstrate the real-world benefits of these processes, inspiring others to consider their implementation.
- → **Publishing in-depth papers**: In 2024, we published papers on city planning, more-than-human governance and "Citizens' Assemblies, Democratic Responses to Authoritarian Challenges in Central and Eastern Europe". The latter highlighted unique, original research into the Eastern European spread of the movement by our Senior Adviser leva Česnulaitytė.
- → Creating engaging media: Developing accessible videos like these in 2024 from Deschutes, Oregon, organising webinars, and doing media interviews to share information about citizens' assemblies and their impact.

DemocracyNext's goals for the next 5 years




Our mission is to scale high-quality, empowered, and permanent citizens' assemblies around the world - for government and for decision-making in other organisations. At a time of geopolitical instability and democracy under threat, this work to empower people, strengthen citizen agency, and increase democratic resilience feel more urgent than ever. Our ambitions are commensurately big. We want more people in more places to know about assemblies and have the tools to set them up and make them sustainable. How we'll do that:

- → Continue publishing research, creating resources, and hosting convenings that enable scaling - with and beyond technology: Building on our scaling white paper, we are launching a Deliberation & Technology (DelibTech) Network with the AI & Democracy Foundation, conducting research on democratic infrastructure for catalysing scaling, creating an AI & Tech Ecosystem Map, and other activities.
- → Create the Institutionalising Assemblies Guide: Developing a legal and political blueprint needed to establish, operate, and integrate citizens' assemblies in governments and institutions.
- → Launch DemFest: A festival-conference that celebrates deliberative and participatory democratic innovation.
- → **Develop "Deliberative Cities":** Work with several cities each year to implement and report back on permanent citizens' assemblies across multiple institutions - from city government to museums, schools, universities, and public banks.
- → Establish the DemNext Citizens' Assemblies Tracker: To monitor public awareness and support for citizens' assemblies and identify needs for further advocacy and education.
- → Publish a Deliberative Systems Impact Framework: A new way of measuring the impact and effectiveness of assemblies on people and policies.
- → Establish a Global Democracy Innovation Index: Building on the impact research and tracker activities.
- → Build an Alumni Network of Former Assembly Members: To facilitate knowledge exchange, peer support, and advocacy.
- → Support the spread of non-governmental assemblies to new sectors: Continuing to support the spread of citizens' assemblies within cultural, educational, economic, and financial institutions, and experiment with more-than-human governance approaches.
